In July 2007, Police Dogs Tyson and Hutch were presented with a top award from the German Shepherd Dog Council of Australia for their work tracking offenders for the Queensland Police Service. The dogs have tracked more than 185 offenders between them wanted for armed hold up, break and enter, murder and other offences. They have also located missing persons and assisted to resolve siege situations.

Tyson was stabbed in the chest during a home invasion a few years ago, but made a full recovery. As a result, the German Shepherd received the Commissioner's Certificate for Bravery in 2001 and has now retired from general duties, but continues to work in drug detection.

Hutch is an exceptional tracker and continues to work in general duties as well as more specialised scent detections.
