The State Crime Operations Command (SCOC) plays a central role in the Service by providing specialist investigative branches to deal with the most complex and challenging criminal issues.

Along with the Commissioner, the Deputy Commissioner, Regional Operations, and the Assistant Commissioner, SCOC, I have endeavoured to ensure the SCOC continues to build on the partnerships it has with other Commands, the CMC Police Group, the police regions, and other law enforcement agencies, both nationally and internationally.

The dynamic environment in which we operate means the nature of many crimes, and the methods we use to investigate them, have changed greatly over the years.

In addition, modern technology and the ease of travel results in a greater incidence of offences which cross regional, and often jurisdictional, boundaries.

This has called for an ever-increasing level of specialist knowledge within the Queensland Police Service, as well as the dedication of resources to target specific categories of crime.

Because of these factors, a statewide specialist response to criminal activity of a systemic or complex nature is essential. State Crime Operations Command is well positioned to provide this response.

The Command's mission is to identify, target and suppress criminal networks and associated criminal activities through the integration of intelligence, investigation and prosecution activities and the provision of specialised and regional support.

I hope this publication will increase awareness of the range of responses and skills the Command provides.

It is a privilege to have the SCOC as part of my portfolio. I am often reminded of the important influence the work of the Command has on the everyday quality of life enjoyed by Queenslanders, and the response it provides to those who are affected by serious crime. It is my aim to ensure this level of response and influence continues.
