You can take steps to reduce identified risk areas in your home and reduce the likelihood of becoming a victim of crime or a repeat victim of crime.

Main entry/exits?	Y	N	The main entry/exit areas to your home should be well lit			
Timers fitted?	Y	N	Lights left on inside your home when you are out often deter intruders

Engraved with code?	Y	N	Property engraving and using WARNING stickers on your property reduces the risk of it being stolen

Inventory list?	Υ	N	Recording serial numbers, makes, models and descriptions of your property helps police recover stolen items and will assist you to make an insurance claim (you may wish to photograph items and store somewhere safe)

Clear vision?	Υ	N	Make sure all doors and windows can be seen clearly fr	om outside			
Trees/shrubs trimmed?	Υ	N	Trim any trees/shrubs that conceal doors and windows from being observed from the street				
Garage/shed secure?	Υ	N	Garages and sheds should be securely locked at all times				
Tools secure?	Υ	N	Lock tools away to prevent an intruder using them to get into your house				
Wheelie bins secured?	Υ	N	Lock wheelie bins away or chain them to a fixed structure away from the house to prevent an intruder using them to climb into your home				
Gates to yard secured?	Υ	N	Lock gates to the backyard with a keyed padlock to prevent access by intruders				
Meter box secured?	Υ	N	Your electricity meter box should be locked (contact your electricity provider to arrange)				
House numbers?	Υ	N _	House numbers should be clearly visible from the road				
Smoke alarms?	Υ	N	Install smoke alarms and develop a fire evacuation plan

Do you keep information about your security arrangements private?  Be aware of providing information about your home security arrangements to people that do not need to know this information. Highlighting your security weaknesses to others could be detrimental.					N		
Do you keep information about your personal arrangements private? Information about bank accounts and balances and personal particulars, including your living arrangements, should not be disclosed unnecessarily. Be conscious of also providing information to others about your planned absences from home.					N		
Do you store valuables out of sight and reach from outside?  Opportunistic thefts can occur when valuables are in clear view and within easy reach. Valuables are best stored out of sight and in a secure location.					N		
Do you have important phone numbers stored in your phone?					N _		
Having your local police station phone number stored in your phone makes it easier to dial, especially in the dark. 000 (triple zero) can also be stored for use in emergencies.
