The Queensland Police Service has developed the Layered Security Assessment Approach to assist communities in protecting their properties. By regularly assessing your home security, introducing targeted security measures, and adjusting everyday habits, you can enhance the safety of your home. Effective home security can be achieved by adhering to the following key principles:

- Make it easy for an offender to be seen
- Make it difficult for an offender to gain entry
- Make it difficult for an offender to exit with your property
- Make it difficult for an offender to gain benefit from your property
